Key concepts:

As per NYP, 27.3% of Indian Population are youth. So, it is very important to understand the profile of Indian Youth.

Objectives:

The main objective of this class are given below –

1. To understand the profile of Indian Youth.

Brief Teaching Plan:

Brief Profile of Indian Youth (Continued...):

Marriage profile:

- Half of women and almost one in five men age between 15 24 years are currently married.
- About 2% of youth are married but their gauna has yet to be performed and a very small proportion (1% of women and 0.3% of men) have experienced a marital disruption.

Youth household profile:

- 1% of women and 8% of men age 15-24 years are household heads.
- Youth in households headed by youth are poorer than youth from households headed by someone who is older.

Menstrual cycle profile:

A large proportion of youth, both women and men, are not aware that a woman is fertile only during specific days in her menstrual cycle. Only 5% of women age 15 – 19 and 14 percent age 20 – 24 knows that a woman is fertile only during the middle of her menstrual cycle.

Family planning profile:

- Only 65% of women and 84% of men have heard or seen a family planning message on TV, radio, wall paintings, or in newspapers/magazines.
- 93% of women know of female sterilization. 83% knows about pills and 71% each knows about IUDs and condoms.
- 93% of men know about condoms but only 78% know about pills, and 37% know about the IUD.
- Only 8% of women and 15% of men know about emergency contraception.
- Most of the youth desire a small family (two or fewer children).
- Like many Indians, youth in India also show a preference for sons.

- More than one-third of men do not know that a woman who is breastfeeding can become pregnant.
- 39% of female youth either have a child or are currently pregnant.
- Youth fertility accounts for more than half of India's total fertility.

HIV/AIDS:

- About two-third of women and 88% of men have heard of AIDS.
- Three out of four men know that the risk of HIV/AIDS can be reduced by condom use and by limiting sex to one uninfected partner; however, less than half on women know about these means of HIV/AIDS prevention.
- Only 20% of women and 36% of men have comprehensive knowledge about HIV/AIDS, i.e., they have correct knowledge of all the ways of transmission and prevention of the infection.
- In many states, less than one-half of women have heard of AIDS.

Methods

- Recap method: repeating the previous session.
- Brief discussion by the students on the topic.
- Experiential learning method involving faculty and students interactions.
- Brainstorming.

Teaching-Learning Material requirements:

- Virtual class through zoom

Time management: 45 Minutes

First 5 minutes:

Recap of previous day.

Next 35 minutes:

Experiential learning method.

Next 5 minutes:

Brainstorming.

Overall Activities in the Class Room

Activity-1: Recap of previous session:

The student will be asked simple questions to complex questions to understand the level of understanding of their previous class.

Activity-2:Experiential Learning:

Experiential learning on the topic i.e., Profile of Indian Youth. Session will be continued for 35 minutes.

Activity-3:Brainstorm on the key concepts:

Which is also an interactive session. Faculty is expecting few questions from student side. Faculty will also ask some questions to brainstorm students and their thinking process.
