CREATING A CULTURE OF UNDERSTANDING THROUGH PEER MEDIATION

Conflict and misunderstanding are part of every social environment, especially in college campuses where students from diverse backgrounds, cultures, and experiences interact daily. Recognizing this, Peace Channel has introduced Peer Mediation a constructive, student-centered approach to resolve conflicts peacefully and promote a culture of mutual respect, empathy and cooperation within educational institutions.

What is Peer Mediation?

Peer Mediation is processes where trained student mediators help their peers address disputes and misunderstandings through guided dialogue, empathy, and collaboration. It empowers students to communicate openly, listen actively and work together to find peaceful, lasting solutions.

Unlike disciplinary actions, Peer Mediation is not about deciding who is right or wrong it focuses on understanding perspectives and restoring trust and harmony.

Common Issues Addressed through Peer Mediation:

Peer Mediation provides a safe and confidential space for students to resolve a wide range of interpersonal and behavioral issues that often disrupt campus harmony. Some of the most common issues include:

- Substance abuse and peer pressure
- Poor classroom attendance and participation
- Lack of communication between students and teachers
- Relationship conflicts among students
- Misunderstandings within student groups or clubs
- Bullying, teasing and exclusion in peer circles
- Academic stress and examination-related anxiety
- Family-related emotional distress affecting academic life
- Conflicts between students and management or faculty
- Cultural and regional misunderstandings among students

Through guided discussions, mediators encourage both parties to share their feelings, recognize common interests, and take responsibility for restoring respect and cooperation.

How Peer Mediation Helps Colleges?

Peer Mediation transforms conflicts into learning opportunities for personal growth and leadership development. It promotes:

- Emotional intelligence and communication skills.
- Leadership and teamwork abilities among students.
- Mutual respect between students, teachers and administrators.
- A more positive and inclusive campus atmosphere.

The values and skills learned through Peer Mediation extend into families, neighbourhoods and workplaces enabling students to become agents of peace and understanding in their communities. It encourages dialogue over division and helps build compassionate, cooperative and peaceful societies.

CURRENT AFFAIRS

National Current Affairs (May–August 2025)

MAY 2025

May 1: Robert Francis Prevost was elected as the new Pope, becoming the first Cardinal from America to hold the position and taking the name Pope Leo XVI.

May 13: India successfully tested 'Bhargavastra', an indigenous counter-drone system, at the Seward Firing Range in Gopalpur, Odisha. This system is designed to counter threats from loitering munitions and weaponized autonomous drones, aligning with the 'Make in India' initiative.

May 22: A terrorist attack occurred near Pahalgam in Jammu and Kashmir, resulting in the deaths of 26 civilians. In response, India launched Operation Sindoor, a counter-terrorism mission aimed at neutralizing terrorist threats in the region.

JUNE 2025

June 15: A helicopter ferrying passengers for a Hindu pilgrimage crashed in the Himalayas in Uttarakhand, India, killing all seven people on board, including a toddler.

June 28: India launched the UPI-UPU Integration Project at the 28th Universal Postal Congress in Dubai, aiming to enhance cross-border payments and financial inclusion by linking India's real-time payment system, UPI, with the UPU's global postal payment network.

JULY 2025

July 15: Indian airstrikes impacted multiple locations in Pakistan and Pakistan-administered Kashmir, killing at least 8 people. Pakistan launched retaliatory strikes in response, escalating tensions between the two nations.

AUGUST 2025

August 30: India observed National Small Industry Day to recognize the pivotal role of Small-Scale Industries (SSIs) and Micro, Small & Medium Enterprises (MSMEs) in economic growth and employment.

August 31: Equity mutual funds in India recorded net inflows for the 54th consecutive month, with total inflows reaching Rs 33,430 crore. The mid-cap fund category stood out with a new record monthly inflow of Rs 5,331

Nagaland – State-Level

June 2025 – NPF urges Rio to rejoin party (TOI): The Naga People's Front (NPF) formally appealed to CM Neiphiu Rio to return to the party. This move comes amid talks of possible realignment of regional political forces. It reflects underlying political shifts in preparation for future elections.

July 2025 – 367 teachers in Nagaland to launch indefinite stir (TOI): Teachers from the 2016 batch under the Rashtriya Madhyamik Shiksha Abhiyan (RMSA) began an indefinite protest in Kohima. They demand regularisation of service and release of pending salaries/benefits. The sit-in highlights ongoing neglect by the government despite repeated appeals.

July 2025 – SDRF Dimapur conducts flood rescue and inspections (DIPR Nagaland): The SDRF released official updates on their rescue missions. Teams evacuated stranded residents, inspected dangerous sites, and provided relief materials. Their operations were crucial in limiting casualties.

August 2025 – Revised guidelines for ILP in Dimapur, Chümoukedima, Niuland (TOI): The state government updated Inner Line Permit (ILP) rules in major districts. The changes include new categories of permits, revised fees, and exemptions for certain groups. It reflects ongoing adjustments in controlling outsider entry into Nagaland.

CURRENT AFFAIRS

Dimapur District News

June 2025 — Quarrying, earth cutting banned near NH-29 (TOI): The DC banned all quarrying and earth-cutting around the highway. This was a precaution against further erosion and landslides. The order was necessary after repeated flooding incidents.

— Nagaland Govt in 'slumber' over NH-29 road erosion (Morung Express): The report criticized the state government for failing to address road erosion on NH-29. Residents and commuters expressed frustration at delays. The issue continues to disrupt movement between Dimapur and other regions.

July 7, 2025 — Flash floods in Dimapur; rescue ops by DDMA & SDRF (India Today NE): Dimapur experienced severe flooding in July, displacing residents and damaging property. Authorities deployed rescue boats and set up camps. Many low-lying colonies were the worst affected.

— Rescue and relief operations in Dimapur (DIPR Nagaland): The district administration confirmed hundreds rescued and relocated to relief camps. Temporary shelters, food, and medical help were provided. Official updates showed coordinated disaster response.

August 2025 — Dimapur Press Club elects new team (Eastern Mirror): The Dimapur Press Club announced a new executive team. The elections highlighted civic engagement among journalists. Such developments keep local press institutions active and accountable.

Chumoukedima District News

May 15, 2025 — Two college students killed in crash (ThePrint/PTI): A tragic accident near New Chümoukedima viewpoint claimed two young lives. Police confirmed the vehicle plunged off the road. The incident sparked calls for better road safety.

— Unity Village incident; DC reacts (local news): A local disturbance in Unity Village prompted an official response from the DC. The administration assured inquiry and follow-up actions. The case reflects challenges of local law and order.

June 2025 — Town Council shuts down illegal water plants (HornbillTV): The Chümoukedima Town Council cracked down on unlicensed water plants. The move was to ensure safe drinking water for residents. It reflects stricter governance at the district level.

July 2025 — Floods submerge lanes in Chümoukedima (HornbillTV/NLTV): Heavy rains left several town lanes submerged. Community videos showed residents wading through waist-deep water. The floods highlighted poor drainage infrastructure.

— Chathe river flooding damages NH-29 (Eastern Mirror): The Chathe river's overflow damaged highway sections inside Chümoukedima. Authorities inspected the affected site to plan repairs. Connectivity between Dimapur and Kohima was severely disrupted.

OUR NEW VENTURE DECENTRALISATION OF PEACE CHANNEL

POLICY GUIDELINES FOR ESTABLISHING BRANCHES OF PEACE CHANNEL

Peace Channel is a youth-led movement committed to nurturing a culture of peace, non-violence, and social harmony. Founded with the vision of empowering individuals, especially young people, to become peace builders, the movement has trained over 150,000 children and youth, along with teachers, religious leaders, and community influencers. Through peace clubs, peer mediation, environmental initiatives, and inter-community dialogue, Peace Channel fosters mutual respect, conflict transformation, and sustainable development.

As Peace Channel celebrates its 20th year of impactful service and journeys toward its Silver Jubilee in 2030, the movement recognizes the need to strengthen and expand its presence across India and beyond. The goal is to establish Peace Channel branches in all districts of India and at least ten international countries by 2030. These branches will serve as hubs of peace education, community engagement, and environmental stewardship, ensuring that the vision of peace reaches every corner of society.

INDEPENDENT REGISTRATION

Each branch shall be registered as an independent unit under the relevant legal framework of its country or region. The branch will operate under the core vision, mission, and values of the Peace Channel movement while adapting to the local context.

MANAGEMENT AND LEADERSHIP

Each branch will have a minimum of seven members (as per society registration requirements India) who are supportive of the movement and the following members should take initiative to start the movement in their-own district, state or nation: it consists of at least three from NEISSR alumni or three members of staff from Peace Channel who are qualified for starting their-own , or certified Peace Channel Leaders who have successfully completed a minimum of 45 days (300 hours) of Peace Channel training (either online or through a visit to the Directorate Office). The seven members will serve as the Governing/Managing Body responsible for decision-making, operations, and adherence to Peace Channel's objectives. In addition, each branch will appoint at least 15 Advisors from the district who will provide guidance, networking, and strategic support to strengthen the initiative.

SEED MONEY SUPPORT

To encourage the establishment of new branches, seed money of up to ₹50,000 to 100000 may be provided with project target or raised locally, after a thorough examination and approval by the Peace Channel Directorate. This financial assistance is intended to cover initial setup costs such as registration, basic infrastructure, and pilot activities. Once the branch becomes self-sustained within one year, the seed money may be returned to the Directorate. The return of funds can be achieved through fundraising efforts within the local community, ensuring both the growth of the branch and the development of the surrounding community.

CORE RESPONSIBILITIES OF EACH BRANCH

- Establish Peace Clubs in schools, colleges, and communities.
- Conduct peer mediation, peace education programs, and skill development workshops and they are permitted to start any initiative mentioned in the directives
- Organize people's forums for peace, tree planting, kitchen gardens, and peace awards to foster active participation in peacebuilding and environmental protection.

SUPPORT FROM THE DIRECTORATE

The Peace Channel Directorate will provide:

- Training materials, resource manuals, and program models.
- Guidance for legal registration and administrative setup.
- Ongoing mentorship and evaluation to ensure adherence to the Peace Channel's mission.

REPORT AND NETWORKING

Each branch will submit periodic activity and financial reports and participate in national and international Peace Channel networking events to share experiences and best practices.

This policy aims to create a nationwide and global network of Peace Channel branches to promote peace and reconciliation. By the Jubilee Year 2030, Peace Channel envisions vibrant branches in every district of India and in at least ten international countries. Through collective action, training, and local leadership, these branches will serve as living models of peacebuilding, environmental protection, and community development.
